Red Tipped Photina Care and Treatment Tips | Denise Requardt - President

Leaf Spot Disease: At 708 Woolsey Dr. we have Red Tipped Photinia shrubs approximately 6 feet high on both sides of the front yard and all around the back yard. We started noticing spots on the leaves in certain areas in the spring of 2018. After much research, including speaking to Texas A&M, I found we must remove all the bushes, or take a chance and spray with a chemical treatment that was suggested. We did spray with a chemical bought at the hardware store and seemed to take care of the issue. But, in spring of 2019 the disease came back and took over all the bushes. At that time I found an individual that is an expert with shrub and grass disease and fungus. He came out and sprayed with a professional chemical and took care of the issue. Now again spring of 2020 the leaf spot disease is back and once again we had the bushes sprayed with the professional chemical treatment. I am bringing this to our neighbor's attention due to the fact that I have seen many yards that have Red Tipped Photinia's with this same disease. Unfortunately this disease is spreading from home to home. Call me if you have questions. Below is additional information that may be helpful.

Disease Symptoms

The main culprit among photinia bush diseases is Entomosporium mespili, the fungus that causes photinia leaf spot. Like most plant fungi, this one thrives in the cool, moist environment of the fall and spring and attacks the most vulnerable new growth that gives the shrub its name, red tipped photinia, and the disease spreads from there. The photinia fungus won't kill the plant immediately or even during the first season, but will return year after year until the constant leaf drop and the depletion of nourishment that results weakens the plant to the point of death.

The first signs of photinia leaf spot are almost unnoticeable. Tiny, round red spots appear on leaf surfaces and because the leaf color of the new growth they attack, the darker red spots are easy to ignore.

In a matter of days, the spots enlarge and eventually become dark purplish circles surrounding gray, dying tissue. The photinia fungus usually spreads from new growth to old only because of the new leaves mak-

ing it easier for the spores to take hold.

Once the fungus takes hold in the red tipped photinia, the disease's circles continue to grow and merge until large unsightly 'sores' cover the dying leaves. The production of spores can be seen in the black blotches inside the circular damage. At this point, there is nothing to be done to keep the disease from running its course.

Recognizing Life Cycles of the Diseases

The red tipped photinia disease follows a definite pattern or cycle and it is important to understand this cycle for the treatment of red tip photinia and disease eradication.

The fungal spores spend the winter in fallen, infected leaves or in late emerging new growth. These spores are released into the air in late winter or early spring where they land on any nearby photinia bush. Diseases like this one tend to

spread from the bottom to the top of the infected plant because the spores can't travel that far. This inability to move any great distance is also the reason photinia leaf spot may attack a shrub in one area of the yard while another area remains untouched.

During the rainy weather of spring, the spores continue to spread through water splashing from one leaf to the next until the entire shrub is infected.

Prevention and Treatment of Common Photinia Bush Disease

Is there anything that can be done about red tip photinia disease? Yes, but it's a matter of prevention rather than cure. First and foremost, rake up all fallen leaves, and if the shrub is already infect-

ed, remove all affected leave and branches. Cover the area under and around the shrubs with new mulch to cover any leaf parts and photinia fungus spores that remain. Do not repeatedly trim endangered shrubs to encourage the new red growth. Keep trimming and shearing confined to the dormant winter months and dispose of all clippings.

Consider replacing dead or dying shrubs with alternatives. A mixed hedge will be more resistant to photinia bush diseases if the susceptible shrubs are placed farther apart. Remember, the spores don't travel very far. Stagger new plantings rather than creating the traditional wall of shrubs. This will increase light and airflow around the shrub and decrease the conditions in which the fungus thrives. There are chemical treatments available. Chlorothalonil, propiconazole, and myclobutanil are the effective ingredients to look for in available fungicides. Be aware, however, treatment must begin early and be repeated every 7-14 days throughout late winter and spring and again in the fall when the weather cools. Red tip photinia disease can be devastating, but with diligence and good garden housekeeping practices, the fungus can be driven from your yard.







<u>Litter and High Grass/Weeds (Section 7A-18/Section 18-13(a))</u>

Homeowners or tenants are responsible for keeping their lawns mowed, clipped mulched or cleared and the property free of litter (garbage, paper, cardboard, wood, glass, bedding, auto parts, appliances, limbs, etc.). The property must be maintained between the curb in front of the house (or if no curb then from the edge of the pavement) to the middle of the alley (or the back property line if there is no alley). Weeds or grass more than 12 inches high is a violation of the City Code. Failure to do so may result in a court citation and/or a bill for the City's mowing services.

Obstructions Alley/Sidewalk/Street (Section 18-14)
The occupant or owner is responsible for keeping the





street, alley, sidewalk and public grounds clear of obstructions. This includes the trimming of trees, shrubbery and vines which may obstruct any vehicle traveling through an alley, or which may obstruct a sidewalk or street or other public grounds. Additionally, sidewalks must have a height clearance of 8 feet - streets and alleys must have 15 feet of overhead clearance. Take advantage of the City's Bulky Trash Program by trimming trees and shrubbery to coincide with your legal Bulky Trash Week.

Substandard Structure (Section 27-11(b))

Property owners are required to keep structures in good repair. Peeling paint, leaking roof, electrical and plumbing problems, holes in the wall, floor and ceiling, and decayed wood are building violations.

Use of Cloth Face Coverings to Help Slow the Spread of COVID-19

How to Wear Cloth Face Coverings

Cloth face coverings should-

- · fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- · be secured with ties or ear loops
- · Include multiple layers of fabric
- · allow for breathing without restriction
- be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape



CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies), **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.

CDC also advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth face coverings fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the cloth face covering without assistance.

The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for healthcare workers and other medical first responders, as recommended by current CDC guidance.



Yes. They should be routinely washed depending on the frequency of use.

How does one safely sterilize/clean a cloth face covering?


A washing machine should suffice in properly washing a cloth face covering.



We had no reported crimes in January and February. March had 4 crimes reported and 1 not reported to the police. We had a couple of vehicles broken into, a tailgate stolen, and lawn equipment stolen while lawn workers were in the backyard. A couple of neighbors prevented some thefts by noticing suspicious individuals and vehicles in the neighborhood.

VIP Patrols

As we honor the Dallas County "Shelter in Place" order we will have fewer VIP Patrols in the neighborhood. We will not be patrolling after 5:30 pm, mainly due to the safety of those neighbors who are out walking, jogging, or walking their dog. The foot traffic picks up after 5:30pm and we believe it is in the best interest to not patrol while neighbors are enjoying a walk through our great neighborhood. If you are out and see any suspicious behavior, I suggest either using the iWatch app to let police know what you witnessed and/or call 911.

iWATCH

Dallas Police Department (DPD) has implemented a phone app to enable citizens to report crime and suspicious behavior, a suspicious individual, or a suspicious vehicle. The software design company has reengineered the app to make it easy to use and can send information to the DPD very quickly for them to review. This does not replace filing a report, so if a car was broken into, lawn equipment stolen, items stolen from your yard or homestead, etc. please file a report. REMINDER: report can be filed on line as well as calling 911.

Crime Prevention and Safety Tips for Spring

As spring sets in and more of us are working from home during the Dallas County "shelter in place order" we are hoping the increase in suspicious and criminal behavior subsides due to the fact that we have so many neighbors working from home, working in their yards, and walking the neighborhood. Here are some tips to making sure you do not become a victim of criminal behavior.

Do not leave any outdoor tools in the front yard for any period of time. Please warn your landscaper or lawn care workers to make sure they know where there equipment is at all times.

Suggest to not park your vehicle on the street at night or if you have no other recourse make sure nothing is left in the vehicle of value and <u>make sure you lock the doors</u>. We do not have a problem of vehicles being broken into

when locked; we have had past issues with someone going from street to street looking for those vehicles that are unlocked.

If you're going to be out of town please making sure you have contacted crime@wynnewoodnorth.org so the VIP's can watch over your home. Another suggestion is make sure you contact your closest neighbors as well as they are around your property more than anyone and can call 911 on any suspicious behavior. If you see any suspicious behavior in your alley, I suggest calling 911 ASAP.

The walking traffic has increased in our neighborhood when we have nice days due to the restrictions - When you're in the neighborhood, walking, jogging, or walking your dog it is always best to walk against traffic or on the left side of the road. The reasoning is you can see the driver of the vehicle and they usually can see you, so adjustments (like sun in your eyes) can be made vs. vehicle coming directly behind you. This suggestion helps as well when we have so many neighbors out walking and enjoying the neighborhood. Those of you bicycling should stay on the right side of the road.

I strongly suggest being a member of Nextdoor.com as this



is where you will get the fastest and most updated information if any suspicious or criminal activity has occurred or been reported. If you are not on Nextdoor, then send information to crime@wynnewoodnorth.org and the Crime Watch Director will post the information. RE-MINDER: we as a neighborhood are safer when we share information with all our neighbors on any suspicious or criminal behavior. Last, but not least if you see any suspicious behavior from

Working From Home

Like many in our neighborhood I am working from home. I'm also thankful to our other front line workers who are keeping our grocery stores open, delivering food, driving trucks to deliver supplies, and on and on. 2020 Heritage Oak Cliff Grant

This year, Heritage Oak Cliff is offering \$35,000 in grant monies to Oak Cliff Neighborhood Associations who are members of Heritage Oak Cliff, Oak Cliff Neighborhood Associations who are non-members and non-profit organizations in Oak Cliff. Wynnewood North will be apply for the following projects: (1) Costs for Webhosting and publishing the newsletter, (2) Purchase of Personalized Welcome Bags, (3) Purchase of Personalized tumblers for VIP and to sell to members of our neighborhood, (4) Costs to maintain the two triangles, (5) Moving the Wynnewood North Sign presently located by the creek area on S. Vernon to the corner of Shelmire and S. Vernon, (6) Purchase of Child Identification Kits, and (7) Purchase of chemicals to treat the pond, and (8) Monies to support our neighborhood schools and for Teacher Appreciation Week.

This grant covers 60% of the cost of the project. Wynnewood North Neighborhood Association is responsible for the other 40%. The application has to be submitted by May 15, 2020.

The Wynnewood North Neighborhood Association Board unanimously approved the application for the grant for the above listed projects. The association has been very fortunate in the past in that we have been approved for all projects we have requested monies for. The grants will be awarded June 8, 2020. Updates will follow.

2018-2019 Neighborhood Vatility Grant

The grant we were awarded last year to the have new sign toppers installed and all new Crime Watch signs installed is still viable. Everything is on hold now due to the restrictions in place because of COVID-19. So, eventually, at some point in time, you will see new sign toppers and new Crime Watch signs. These upgrades are expected to happen the latter part of the summer or in the fall.
