

Hello Wynnewood Neighbors!

The 4th of July parade is over – but summer just started. Practice Summer Heat Safety.

Never leave an infant or young child alone in a closed car in the summer. That applies all year long, as far as I'm concerned, but in the summer, a closed car heats up as much as 20 degrees in 10 minutes. I know you would never consider putting a child in the oven. So, don't leave a baby in a closed car – even for an errand that should only take a minute. The same goes for an invalid or anyone else who can't open the car door and get to a cool place on his own. And for the Williams family – that includes pets too!

Keep the Kids Hydrated

Remember to drink plenty of water when you're outside in the heat. Children playing summer sports should drink water the night before a day of practice, and keep drinking all day long, before they become thirsty. People who work outside are at greatest risk. Bring a cooler with water so you don't run out.

Monitor Seniors Medications

Older people or people with heart conditions, diabetes and other health problems will need to be extra cautious about heat. That doesn't mean they need to stay indoors all summer. Far from it. But they won't have the stamina they once did. And they may be taking medication that interferes with warning signs for heat exposure. Thirst, for example, is an early warning signal of dehydration. But some medicines make patients feel thirsty all the time, so they may not recognize thirst from overheating. Medicines for depression, insomnia and poor circulation also put people at risk for extreme heat. If you know anyone at risk for heat stroke, check on them at least twice a day during a heat wave. And if you stop sweating, feel clammy and cold or dizzy get out of the sun and get help. You may be developing heat stroke. Deb and I give a cold water to the mail folks, prime, etc.

And for the pets

Remember that cement is hot. Anyone walk on the cement barefoot? Always make sure they have water out. And it's ok to spoil them a bit with a little cold AC.

Remember – a cold beer is not a glass of water. So, keep hydrated. With that said, enjoy yourself.

Stay Safe Around Water

Never let a child near water unattended. And watch them constantly. A child can drown in six inches of water or wander from the shallow end of the pool to the deep end in a moment. Keep that pool clean.

Protect Your Skin Against Sunburn

If you put sunscreen on at the beginning of a day of outdoor play or work and then forget about it, please rethink your approach.

Sweat and water wash away sunscreen, regardless of what the label says, so it's best to reapply every hour or two. A sunburn makes you more vulnerable to skin cancer later in life. I already look like a prune – so I'm wearing a hat and use sunscreen. (Well usually) A typical sunburn is the same as a first-degree burn. And if it blisters, that's a second-degree burn.

Treating Sunburn

As for treatment, the best is to wait for the sunburn to heal and avoid a second burn. It's fine to use a moisturizer, with or without aloe vera, to soothe sunburn. Avoid creams with topical antihistamines since they may sensitize your skin to that medication and lead to an allergic reaction.

Keep the Bugs at Bay

Mosquito bites are mostly an annoyance, but in rare cases mosquitoes may carry West Nile virus, encephalitis, or other illnesses. Ticks too can be more than an annoyance. In rare cases ticks in this part of

the country carry Rocky Mountain spotted fever. So, it's best to avoid insect bites. I am a mosquito magnet. Which is one of the reasons Deb married me. So – spray, spray, spray.

And last – keep out a watchful eye around the neighborhood.

Surrounding neighborhood kids have more time on their hands. It's hot – so people get a bit more impatient. Don't hesitate to call the police if there is an emergency. Don't take a grievance into your own hands.

VOLUNTEER TO HELP THE VIP!

And if you go on vacation – let your neighbors know. Neighbors watching out for neighbors make Wynnewood a bit safer. Don't hesitate to let me and the VIP folks know – but it's even more important to tell your surrounding neighbors you are leaving. They can keep a watchful eye out on a more regular basis.

Dallas Online Reporting System



Improving service to Dallas residents is a priority for the Dallas Police Department (DPD). To make the reporting of non-emergency crimes easier and more convenient, DPD has created an online reporting system that is available 24 hours per day.

ONLINE REPORTING PROCESS:

- Go to dallaspolice.net. Click on "FILE A POLICE REPORT ONLINE." Select the type of offense you want to report. Fill out and submit the report.
- Once the report is submitted, you will get an e-mail confirming it has been submitted along with a tracking number. The report will be reviewed and an e-mail will be sent notifying you of its status:
 - Approved You will receive a second email with a copy of the official report and case number.
 - Follow up You will receive a second email with a request to make changes to the report, and 30 days to make any corrections.
 - Rejected The submitted report is either a duplicate or did not meet the requirements for a crime.

A Little about Heritage Oak Cliff

Heritage Oak Cliff, founded as the Old Oak Cliff Conservation League, was formed in 1975 primarily to save Winnetka Heights from a demise that would have left an irreplaceable hole in Dallas' history. Today, Winnetka Heights is one of the most beautiful neighborhoods in Oak Cliff and remains an integral part of the Dallas community.

Almost every street in Oak Cliff has a story to tell and showcases the great diversity of Dallas. Those who choose to settle here do so for Oak Cliff's beauty and rich history. Many built large gorgeous homes designed by some of the most talented architects of the day. Others focused on smaller homes designed by planners and architects with an eye toward quality, durability and family life. Over time, styles continue to evolve, and new neighborhoods emerge to reflect those changes. Heritage Oak Cliff views all neighborhoods as partners in promoting Oak Cliff as a thriving community welcoming to all.

Today Heritage counts more than 30 member neighborhoods, stretching from Interstate 30 south to Camp Wisdom Road. From long established neighborhood associations to smaller neighborhood groups beginning their journeys, all contribute to the beauty, diversity, and vitality that is Oak Cliff. We have done our best below to capture a map of the neighborhoods.

For over 40 years, Heritage OC has produced the annual Old Oak Cliff Home Tour. 2021 saw the introduction and great success of our new event Passport Oak Cliff, which targets a more neighborhood participation and community building. By no means are we done with home tours, we are just evolving. The proceeds of the Home Tours and Passport Oak Cliff are used to grant awards to member neighborhoods for conservation, beautification and preservation projects and other projects that enhance each neighborhood.

WNNA Directory Data Refresh! Complete Your Information

Many wonderful people have moved into the neighborhood and others have changes to phone numbers and email addresses. It is time to connect us all with an updated printed WNNA Directory. Each household will receive a custom directory card which reflects the current information in the WNNA directory database. The cards will be distributed in September. When you receive yours, please review it and make sure all information is correct. Make any necessary edits and corrections then deliver the card to the designated box located in the yard at 519 Woolsey Drive. (Box located at the corner near the garage door)

ALL CARDS must be returned!

Please note, the public will **NOT** have access this directory. Only people that live within Wynnewood North and are registered on our website will be able to see this information. Being able to contact residents that live in Wynnewood North is extremely important. Providing your phone numbers, allows the Volunteers in Patrol to contact homeowners while doing safety patrols. The Email addresses in the directory database are used when an E-blast is sent to the entire neighborhood. If your email is incorrect or missing you will not receive the information. Eblasts are used to promote neighborhood events, inform neighbors about a variety of topics (safety updates, City issues, social events, lost & found pets).

Should you not want your information in the directory, you can opt out. You will see this option on the data card. It is highly recommended that you share this information so we all can work together to keep Wynnewood North the great fun and safe place. While you are checking your information, you will notice there is a place for you to enter all your pet(s) information. Please do this. Unfortunately, pets do get loose, and we can use this to help find the owner if a stray pet is found.

Again, this directory is private and can only be seen by residents in Wynnewood North who have registered on our website.



A Few Good People Needed

Everyone wants to feel safe and secure in his or her home and neighborhood. One of the least costly and most effective ways to reduce neighborhood crime is to set up a neighborhood watch program (our VIP program). The programs are a good way to forge relationships between area residents, which help to reduce robberies and burgla-



ries. Neighborhood programs also often improve relationships between communities and the police that serve them in addition to serving as a springboard for other community efforts. Research has proven that neighborhood watch programs dramatically decrease burglaries and other related offenses. That includes a lot of things. Simple things like making sure gates are closed, garage doors are down, and packages are put away.

Our VIP members are essentially the eyes and ears of our neighborhood. Members are generally responsible for watching out for each other, getting to know neighbors, and learning to make their homes secure. Members are also responsible for reporting suspicious activities or potential crimes to law enforcement. Neighborhood watch members should be on the lookout for strangers exhibiting odd behavior, people yelling for help, someone looking in house or car windows, and other suspicious behaviors.

Watch members should not only be on the lookout for suspicious activities but should also report the incidents to law enforcement with as much detail as possible to help keep the community safe. Neighborhood watch programs are beneficial for many reasons. 

Wynnewood North board and committee will be reviewing information the upcoming months in reference to Neighborhood Stabilization Overlay vs Conservation Districts.

During out April 2022 General Meeting our Guest Speaker, Paul Cardin, shared high level information in reference to both types of protection for neighborhoods. We will discuss this further at our next General Meeting and set up meetings for committee discussions.

The Neighborhood Stabilization Overlay, or NSO, is just that; an overlay. It overlies the base zoning and adds additional restrictions to that

How To Know When It Is Time For Bulk Trash?

See the Sign, then it's Time!

(Look for the signs at each entrance into our neighborhood)

FEAR NOT! Snakes are among us, Oh My!

Oak Cliff is blessed with some parkland and green belts that run along numerous creeks, which drain into the nearby Trinity River. These dense woods provide homes and avenues for a few of the hardiest native species. Our neighbor-

hood is far more special than most residents realize. Many have seen coyotes, foxes, hawks and owls, raccoons and opossums. Anyone near the lake can see ducks, egrets, herons, and the seasonal turtle crossing on Llwellyn. An elderly female box turtle has been seen on North Manus adjacent to the DART property. The lake, creek, and woods bless us with plentiful migrant and resident songbirds. Histori-

cally, we've had good numbers of skinks, anoles, and spiny lizards, but the burgeoning feral cat population has decimated them. Cats most certainly diminish the bird life, as well.

Sadly, too many folks missed out on the advantages of girl/boy scout nature lessons or high school biology classes. The misguided phrase "the only good snake is a dead snake" is based upon an absence of knowledge or understanding of nature and native local animals. Snakes are a key piece of the complex web of life with which we share the planet. All snakes are predators with specialized life styles focused on each species' preferred type of prey. For instance, the common blind snake found in our neighborhood is a tiny pink underground burrower about the size of an earthworm, and eats ant and termite eggs. Texas rat snakes can grow to over six feet long, and prefer old mature woodlands, like some of Oak Cliff's creeks and parks, where they eat birds and eggs in the spring and rats and squirrels in the summer.

Most snake species live within a small home range. A blind snake may live its entire life in the same termite nest deep underground. An adult rat snake may have half a dozen favorite trees with hollow branches or trunks that provide shelter for them and their prey, as well as a couple of deep rotten root systems or rock crevices where it can escape the summer heat and hibernate in the winter.

The danger represented by venomous snakes is routinely and deliberately misrepresented by many writers. Hardly a day goes by that doesn't feature "deadly snake found in toilet", or "world's deadliest snake found in Texas" in misleading headlines. There are fewer than a dozen common harmless species still seen in the DFW area with any regularity. They are all easy to identify based on where they are found, shape, size, color, and pattern. Add to that the rarity of any venom-

ous snakes seen in the greater DFW urban sprawl, with only the tiniest fragments remaining of anything like natural habitat, and you have a situation of pretty much any snake you will ever see is almost guaranteed to be common and harmless.

So, what's crawling around in our neighborhood? We know there are rat snakes. They are common in much of

Oak Cliff. Dallas Zoo staff tracked and studied rat snakes on zoo grounds for decades. I've only ever seen blind snakes [6" pink pencil lead-size] and lined ground snakes [12" tan/brown lines down the body on top, black spots down the white belly] squashed on the street following heavy rains. I see rough earth snakes [8" unmarked slate gray/brown] when I move compost or firewood, or, sadly, hit one that was

hidden in the grass with the edger. That's it. A number of other species once inhabited this immediate area, but have not been seen for a hundred years, give or take. The larger regional lakes are home to two common species of harmless water snakes. At the outer reaches of the greater metropolitan area venomous snakes are sometimes seen. Water moccasins live in the bottomland below Lake Lewisville, copperheads may be found in some of the largest natural areas, and rattlesnakes, copperheads, and coral snakes are encountered around Joe Pool Lake and the hills southwest of Cedar Hill.

There have been sightings of common Texas rat snakes in Wynnewood North. The smaller snake circulating on NextDoor is likely a very young rat snake, maybe a yearling. The larger one is a grown adult female, most likely pregnant. It is a little unusual, in that "T-rats", as the kids in the herpetological society call them, are normally darker and less distinctly patterned than this one. T-rats are completely harmless, to us, to kids, and to pets. No one needs to call 311, or anyone else. They are common throughout the green belt, but are very secretive. It is a rare and special treat to get to see one. It's like if you saw a cardinal/redbird only once every 20 yrs. People see them at the zoo more often, but that's because there are so many people moving and working all over the place. Staff there have marked and repeatedly observed many individual snakes over many years.

The Spring and Fall Wanders have been Wynnewood North Neighborhood Association's biggest fundraisers of the year. The proceeds help fund numerous activities, events and projects in the neighborhood. "Are you fostering any kittens?" It's a question I get asked frequently by people that know me and my insatiable love of animals. The answer is usually yes. Thanks to the pandemic and being stuck at home, I now have a "Kitten Lounge", a climate-controlled room off the back of our house where I can accommodate fosters year-round. Usually it's a mama cat and her kittens, although I have taken care of abandoned kittens or adult cats in need of a little extra TLC. You see, I foster for the SPCA of Texas, and quite a few of their rescues come from hoarding, abuse, or neglect cases. It can take a little extra time for these animals to decompress and begin their healing journey.

I've also had some wonderful foster dogs, one of them considered a "fospice". At the SPCA, an animal is designated a fospice candidate if they are too old and/or

have illnesses that make them unsuitable for a typical adoption. As a fospice foster, you take care of them for the rest of their days as if they are your own, and all medical costs are covered by the



SPCA. I love, love senior animals, and the seniors that I've fostered or fospiced are my absolute favorites.

If you enjoy having animals in your life, I strongly recommend fostering. There are many organizations that are always in need of a helping hand. Don't think you have time? Travel or work too many hours to foster or adopt? If you're a dog lover, try the Borrow A Buddy program at the SPCA. You can take a dog out for a hike and then lunch at your favorite dog-friendly patio, or have them hang out with you at your place for up to 3 days. You get the companionship of a four-legged lovebug or avid runner, and they get a break from the shelter. It's a win-win!

And if you're not interested in fostering or volunteering, there are other ways to help. Most shelters and rescues are always in need of donations, whether it be your old towels and linens or new items off their Amazon wish list. And don't forget the hard-working people that care for these animals day after day. Most, if not

all, shelters are currently overflowing with lost, surrendered or abandoned pets. It's been really hard on animal care staff, whether they be a kennel keeper or vet tech, entry level or supervisor.

Send them a card with your thanks, or some Tiff's Treats or other yummy pick-me-up. They are truly unsung and underappreciated heroes that are essential to our community.

Irrigation of landscaped areas with hose-end sprinklers or automatic irrigation systems is limited to no more than twice per week according to the MANDATORY Twice-Weekly Watering Schedule. No watering is allowed on Mondays, Tuesdays or Fridays and from April 1-October 31, watering is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on all days of the week, including the allowed watering days.
