As I reflect back on the flurry of activity between January 2006 when I assumed this post and now, I am amazed at what has been accomplished by the Boards and our Wynnewood neighbors. We have accomplished several firsts and have set several records for WN! As I was brainstorming for ideas to write about for this article I recalled one of my favorite quotes, "A dream is just a dream until you write it down, then it becomes a goal." Goals, with appropriate action are what make the difference between dreams being just dreams. I am very proud to announce that your Board has not only set goals but we have delivered on our objectives. We also continue to take action to improve Wynnewood North!

The Board identified top priorities for the neighborhood: safety, beautification, social activities, and civic involvement. We set forth to put actions in place to accomplish those goals. We raised over \$24,000 in record time for the Omni-Watch (OW) Security Camera System. We were con-

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cerned that surrounding neighborhoods would get OW before us. Our major concern was the fact that being a follower with OW, not a leader, would potentially increase crime in our beat so we stepped it up a notch and beat them to the punch! Believe me, raising the money in such a short time was no small feat but we accomplished our goal and have all but one of the initial cameras installed already! You should all feel very proud because we could not have done it without the support of your generous tax-deductible donations (please keep them coming!).

You may not have noticed but the large OW signs are now posted throughout the neighborhood. These should help squelch crime significantly as they are posted at all of the major entrances/exits of the development. We will be putting up the rest of the small OW signs soon;

you may get a visit from one of the Board members requesting permission to post a sign on your alley fence. Thanks to Andy Shell and John Ridgley for taking point on sign installation and to Gail Ridgley and Robert Curlin for helping us ID where the signs should be posted.

As you will read in Andy's article, there is a process we must follow before we can allow access to view the cameras online. We will review this process at the General Meeting on April 19th so I encourage you all to attend the meeting. Meanwhile, if you run into Andy Shell, please thank him for all that he has done for WN as Crime Watch Captain. I can not tell you how many hours Andy has poured into the OW project but I can tell you that it has been nothing short of a part time job for several of us. That means it has been

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Crime Watch Update

I hope everyone is enjoying the wonderful spring weather changes and the wonderful "greening" of the neighborhood. We're on the brink of change in one way we are approaching crime prevention in our neighborhood, as we are close to finalizing the last steps in the installation of our initial twelve security cameras through the Omni-Watch system.

We've had to relocate two cameras, and are working to find hosts that are as close as possible to the original desired locations. The neighborhood is very grateful to our camera host homeowners, who've unselfishly agreed to have a camera installed on their property and share their DSL uplink. As much as we would love to list the names of these generous folks, we'd prefer not to publicize the initial camera locations. THANKS TO ALL OF YOU!

There are some technology challenges and a learning curve that we've all had to work through in getting the cameras' signals through the various internet providers, and then coordinated within the network to be visible online. Omni-Watch's technical support team has been working to resolve these issues quickly and successfully each step. The good news is the digital video recorders have been saving images from the less challenging cameras since installation!

The most visible components of the system, of course, are the large warning signs. These signs are the size of typical traffic signs and installed at the same height. The signs were recently delivered and we now have them installed in several locations near most all entrances and exits. We have ordered and are coordinating additional large sign installations.

Additionally, we have many smaller signs which can be placed at alley entrances. If you are a homeowner living at the end of an alley, and will allow us to attach one of the signs on your fence, please contact 214.941.6160 Shell at crime@wynnewoodnorth.org. The two methods we have at this time for securing the signs are Liquid Nails and tamper-resistant wood screws. If you know of a good location, or would volunteer a small piece of your fence to help fight crime, please give Andy a call.

As this first camera installation phase and betatesting is completed, we need to schedule our group V.I.P. (Volunteers In Patrol) training sessions, which the association voted to have those WNNA residents complete who wish to have camera viewing access through the Omni-Watch website. Prerequisites for

the City of Dallas Police V.I.P. Training include: minimum age of 18 and no criminal history in the past two years for class B misdemeanors or higher. Participants will also execute a confidentiality agreement regarding authorized use of the system with WNNA. The V.I.P. program is a 7-hour course split over two Saturdays. It is part classroom work, part 911 call center orientation/observation, and an optional ride with a Dallas Police Beat Officer for one shift. We are trying to schedule the "group" course specifically put together for our neighborhood, and hope to be able to have this info by the April general meeting. Once interested residents have completed V.I.P. training and signed the agreement, we'll be able to provide instructions to them on setting up access to the OW cameras via their home and/or work computer via the Internet with their own User ID and password.

Many in the neighborhood have experienced recent crimes such as cars being broken into (BMVs) or having wheels and rims stolen. For each occurrence we're aware of, we have requested an increase in police patrol and provided email blasts to provide any known information. The Crime Watch warning sings have also been posted with information on the outgo-

Earth Day: A Community Celebration

Since the first Earth Day in 1970, people around the world have been creating their own ways to celebrate Earth, to observe the beauty and vitality of nature—and to renew their commitment to saving our living planet. Oak Cliff is no exception, and on April 22, the Oak Cliff community will be hosting an Earth Day Fair and Cultural Festival in Lake Cliff Park.

United States Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin is credited with establishing the first Earth Day in response to an oil spill off the coast of Santa Barbara in 1969. According to lore, he was so outraged by what he saw that he returned to Washington and introduced a bill to inspire awareness of and appreciation for Earth's environment. In the wake of the Earth Day bill, Congress passed a number a laws, such as the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act and the Endangered Species Act. Earth Day quickly gathered momentum at a grassroots level and is now celebrated by over 500 million people in 175 countries, making it the largest secular holiday in the world.

In honor of Earth Day, here are some tips and gadgets you can use around the house to save energy:

For the Nature Neophyte:

Switch to cold water when doing laundry. 85-90% of the energy used to wash clothes is used to heat the water. Cost Free

Do-it-Yourself Energy Audit Programs assess the energy usage in your house and offer recommendations on how to use energy more efficiently. Cost Free

Use the recyclable Razor Preserve – at least 65% of the handle is made from recycled Stoneyfield Farm yogurt cups. Cost \$7.00

Invest in a low-flow shower head, which can reduce your water usage by up to 20% and save you up to \$200.00 per year. Cost \$10.00



Try Vermiculture Composting, which uses worms to decompose organic food waste, turning the waste into a nutrient-rich material capable of supplying necessary nutrients to sustaining healthy plant life and vital growth and adding beneficial organisms to the soil. Cost \$25.00

Eclipse Solar Gear produces backpacks, coolers and camera bags with built-in solar panels that can charge cell phones, iPods, PDA's and GPS devices while on the go. Cost \$150.00+

Powered completely by solar energy, a single solar attic fan can fully vent up to 1,200 square feet. Cost \$315.00

Tankless water heaters heat water only as it is needed and can save 30-50% on water heating costs. Cost \$900.00+

Conservation Connoisseur:

The Dileka is a water filter that transforms tap water into highly ionized, balanced water containing fewer polluting agents and bacteria and requires no replacement parts or electricity to operate. Cost \$2,800.00+

The QR5 is a residential-scale wind turbine that generates enough electricity to power a standard U.S. home or a small office. Cost \$48,000.00

The RK1 model prefab house assembles in one day and features LED lighting, solar panels and an environmental monitoring system. Countertops, tiles, structural steel and insulation are produced from recycled materials. Cost \$775,000.00.

ing message of the Crime Watch Hotline. These crimes increased and appeared to be tied to kids during Spring Break; and we've actually noticed a recent drop in activity. Thank you to all neighbors who have taken the time to report these crimes and associated details to 911 and Wynnewood Crime Watch.

For those who have not had the opportunity to provide a financial contribution towards the cost of the camera system, or are new to the neighborhood, please understand that we still need your support. So far, about 58% of the neighborhood has contributed the base funds for initial system installation; your support to cover the cost of monthly monitoring fees, added cameras as needed, and any possible maintenance issues is still much needed. Our suggested minimum donation was \$75 - \$100 per household to cover a 3year period. We have received several more generous donations--even up to \$1500 from a few households, boosting our ability to make this come together in just 7 months.

The WNNA Board would like to extend a special thanks to Terry Thomas and Mary Scherer, both previous Board members, for their continued help and advice in coordinating our neighborhood crime fighting efforts. Terry still places the signs at the entrances and monitors the WNNA Crime Watch Hotline. Mary has volunteered to attend community meetings and DPD meetings involving Crime Watch on our behalf.

As you all know, successfully entering this agreement with Omni-Watch has been a vast effort shared by many in the neighborhood. Because all our camera host homeowners lead busy lives, this installation phase has been a challenging effort to organize, communicate, and schedule; consequently, it's taken a little longer than we'd hoped, and we appreciate your continued patience and support. But remember that installing a camera system like this is only the first step, as the on-going effectiveness of this project will be determined only by the participation and dedication of our Crime Watch committee volunteers and network of system users.

A neighborhood infrared video camera real-time digital recording security system makes Wynnewood North another "first" for Oak Cliff; so if you have some time and would be willing to get more involved with our state-of-the-art Crime Watch effort, please contact Andy Shell to volunteer!




Creating Pots of Color

You can create your own masterpieces for the patio, porch or as an accent in the flowerbed. Just follow these easy steps and have fun!

- Select a container appropriately sized for the job. Make sure it has drainage holes and is large enough for making an impact.
