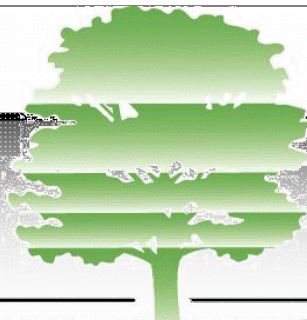

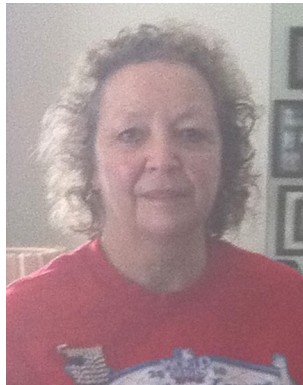
Awards Given for Outstanding Service

“Thank You For a Great Year”

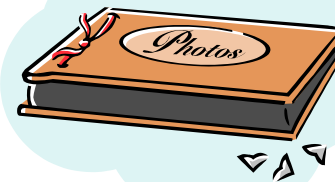

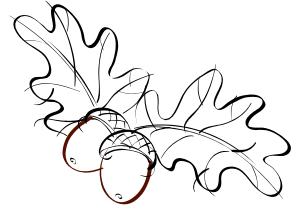

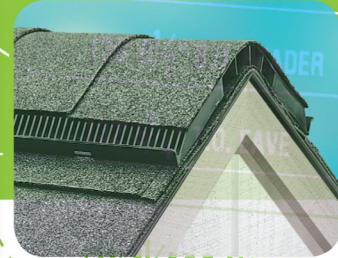

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Four Outside-the-Box Things You Can Do to Help Animals in 2012

So, you want to take your commitment to animals one step further in 2012? Whether it was your New Year's resolution, or you're just always looking for new ways to help (Go, you!) read on; here are four things you can do for animals that you may not have considered before.

1. **Foster Animals:** You already make adoption your first option when it comes to adding a furry member to your family, but there's another way you can open your home to a pet in need: fostering. Shelters all over the country, including the ASPCA Adoption Center in NYC, rely on foster parents to care for animals who aren't quite ready for adoption—usually pregnant moms, mothers with newborn litters, young kittens and puppies, and recovering sick or injured animals. It's a great way to help save lives without the cost or lifelong commitment of adoption.
2. **Citizen Lobbyist:** Maybe you're a member of the ASPCA Advocacy Brigade—if not, what are you waiting for?—but you're looking for more hands-on ways to fight for animal-friendly legislation. If that's you, consider attending a town hall meeting with your legislator. It's much easier than it might seem: You need only choose a meeting (they're easy to find on your legislators' websites, and you can look up your legislators with our handy tool) and then ask a question that lets the lawmaker know you care about animals.
3. **Beyond Dog-Walking:** Shelters love volunteers, and you can find information about how to step up and help out on most of their websites. (If you live in NYC, learn how you can help out at our Adoption Center here.) But before you sign up to walk dogs, take a look at your own special skills and talents, and consider how you might put them to use for animals. If you know your way around a camera, shelters need your help! Great animal photos help get potential adopters in the door. A few other skills shelters can use: writing, event planning, carpentry, web design and social media. Get creative!
4. **Friend of the Ferals:** If you've seen feral cats in your community and felt concerned for their well-being, consider making 2012 the year you help improve their lives. Feral cats live outdoors, and their lives are difficult and often short. But you can help reduce feral cat suffering by getting involved with Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR).

Cold Weather Tips

Brrrr—it's cold outside! The following guidelines will help you protect your companion animals when the mercury dips.

1. Keep your cat inside. Outdoors, felines can freeze, become lost or be stolen, injured or killed. Cats who are allowed to stray are exposed to infectious diseases, including rabies, from other cats, dogs and wildlife.
2. During the winter, outdoor cats sometimes sleep under the hoods of cars. When the motor is started, the cat can be injured or killed by the fan belt. If there are outdoor cats in your area, bang loudly on the car hood before starting the engine to give the cat a chance to escape.
3. Never let your dog off the leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm, dogs can lose their scent and easily become lost. More dogs are lost during the winter than during any other season, so make sure yours always wears ID tags.
4. Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when he comes in out of the sleet, snow or ice. He can ingest salt, antifreeze or other potentially dangerous chemicals while licking his paws, and his paw pads may also bleed from snow or encrusted ice.
5. Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter, as a longer coat will provide more warmth. When you bathe your dog in the colder months, be sure to completely dry him before taking him out for a walk. Own a short-haired breed? Consider getting him a coat or sweater with a high collar or turtleneck with coverage from the base of the tail to the belly. For many dogs, this is regulation winter wear.
6. Never leave your dog or cat alone in a car during cold weather. A car can act as a refrigerator in the winter, holding in the cold and causing the animal to freeze to death.
7. Puppies do not tolerate the cold as well as adult dogs, and may be difficult to housebreak during the winter. If your puppy appears to be sensitive to the weather, you may opt to paper-train him inside. If your dog is sensitive to the cold due to age, illness or breed type, take him outdoors only to relieve himself.
8. Does your dog spend a lot of time engaged in outdoor activities? Increase his supply of food, particularly protein, to keep him, and his fur, in tip-top shape.
9. Like coolant, antifreeze is a lethal poison for dogs and cats. Be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills from your vehicle, and consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol. Visit the [ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center](#) more information.
10. Make sure your companion animal has a warm place to sleep, off the floor and away from all drafts. A cozy dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow is perfect.

Winter Timely Tips

In the Garden

Prune trees, shrubs and roses. Remove diseased and storm-damaged wood.

Water landscape in advance of freezing weather.

Start envisioning your Spring garden; create a plan.

Refresh garden soils with organic materials.

Edible Gardens

Plant Fruit trees and berries.

Texas gardeners can enjoy garden fresh produce year -round. Draw a garden plan and schedule to plant cool season vegetables.

Rotate crop locations from last year. (Planted in succession your garden crops will keep harvests coming.)

Purchase seeds for early Spring crops.

For the Lawn

Service the lawn mower – change the oil, sharpen the blades, tune-up the engine

Pull vigorous winter weeds. Show them who's boss!

Interior Spaces

Pack away the holidays then refresh empty spaces.

Lightly water indoor plants. Remember, plants clean the air and reduce stress.

Mist foliage with water to ward off unwanted pests as heated winter air is dry.

Repot root bound plants. Keep plants fed and watered.



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USS Woolsey (DD-437)

Commodore Melancthon Taylor Woolsey

Commodore Melancthon Taylor Woolsey (1782 – 18 May 1838) was an officer in the United States Navy during the War of 1812 and battles on the Great Lakes. He supervised warship construction at Navy Point in Sackets Harbor, New York, and later had a full career in the Navy.

Commodore Melancthon Brooks Woolsey

Melancthon Brooks Woolsey (11 August 1817 – 2 October 1874) was an officer in the United States Navy during and after the American Civil War. He was commodore of the South Atlantic Station in the 1870s. He was the first son of Commodore Melancthon Taylor Woolsey.

USS Woolsey

USS *Woolsey* (DD-437), a Gleaves-class destroyer, was the 2nd ship to be named Woolsey in the United States Navy. It is the first to be named for both Commodore Melancthon Brooks Woolsey and his father Commodore Melancthon Taylor Woolsey. Woolsey was laid down on 9 October 1939 at Bath, Maine by the Bath Iron Works, launched on 12 February 1941, sponsored by Mrs. Irving Spencer, and commissioned on 7 May 1941



with Lieutenant Commander William H. Von Dreele in command.

Following a shakedown cruise in the Caribbean Sea, Woolsey joined the Atlantic Fleet at the beginning of the second week in September. The attack on Pearl Harbor and America's entry into World War II found the destroyer in Iceland completing the first leg of one such round-trip voyage. War brought a change to Woolsey's range of duties. Her convoy escort work was broadened to include voyages to the British Isles and Puerto Rico. That duty occupied her energies until the fall of 1942 when she participated in her first invasion operation. After a series of training operations along the eastern seaboard primarily off the New England coast the destroyer began duty escorting transatlantic convoys in mid-January 1943.

Woolsey (DD-437) earned seven battle stars during World War II.

Streets in Wynnewood North Named after WWII Battleships

Angus G. Wynne, founder of Wynnewood Village Shopping Center and community development in Oak Cliff, served in the Navy in World War II. When Wynnewood North was developed, the streets were named after battleships from WWII.; these battleships had been named in honor of men serving in the Navy.

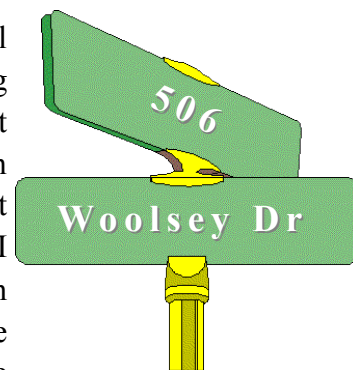
