

Tips for Winter Gardeners—Provided by Calloway's and Cornelius Nursery

Timely Tips for January Gardeners



Working in your garden is an excellent escape during the holidays. It's a great time of year to do some of the heavy work in the landscape as opposed to sweating it up in the heat of the summer.

Don't put up the mower yet. Although turf grasses have stopped growing, you can use the mower to chop up and recycle the leaves back into the lawn or for a compost pile. Prepare gas-powered engines for winter. The owner's manual is the best guide to winterizing a lawn mower, tiller, garden tractor or other equipment. Drain and store garden hoses and watering equipment in

a readily accessible location. Lawns and other plants



may need an occasional watering during prolonged dry spell.

In general, once the weather gets and stays cold, pruning of deciduous plants (ones that lose their leaves) can be safely done. Evergreen hedges can be sheared or cut back in the winter also.

Wait until February to prune your roses. Remember – Do Not Top your Crapemyrtles! Simply prune to remove seed heads and shape.

Prepare for the cold weather before it hits! One of the best things you can do for your landscape plants is to provide a 2 to 3 inch layer of mulch. Mulching is necessary year round but during the colder periods it provides a layer of insulation for the roots. Water your landscape well before a cold spell. A drought stressed plant is more susceptible to freeze damage. For more tender plants, purchase **frost cloth** for extra protection. Cover the plant completely allowing the edges to come all the way to the ground, utilizing the heat which radiates from the ground.

December is a perfect time to plant trees and shrubs so they can develop a strong root system for next Spring. Cool weather color such as Pansies, Snapdragons, Cyclamen, Flowering Cabbage and Kale add splashes of color to your landscape. Spring flowering bulbs can be planted now once they have been properly chilled. Make your home beautiful with a stunning assortment of floral quality Poinsettias, Cyclamen, and the freshest greenery. Add a mix of new indoor and tropical plants to energize your home.

Remember to provide food and water for the birds this winter. You can attract just as many birds with a bird bath as with food, especially during the dry spells. To draw a diversity of birds provide a variety of seeds, like sunflower, thistle, safflower and millet; plus suet. Once you begin putting out bird food, continue feeding them through the spring time. Enjoy your time with family and friends. We hope you had a very Merry Christmas and have a blessed Happy New Year!

Ability to Specify Emergency Contact Information

Please be sure to log-in and check the directory information listed for you. If your phone number has changed or your email address, please make the correction. Also, you will notice an Emergency Contact has been added. This was added in case there was an emergency and someone needed to be notified about the situation. Our VIPs use the directory

frequently. Notifying owners of garage doors left open, packages left on porches, dogs loose, etc.

Ability to Register Your Pet

It could be a life saver! Accidents happen, your pet gets loose without you knowing it. If you register your pets in the neighborhood directory our residents have another source to help return them home safe.

Did you know in 2016 the Board of Directors, with the help of an Old Oak Cliff Conservation League Grant, purchased a pet micro-chip reader! Denise Requardt has volunteered to be the Master Scanner for Wynnewood North. How cool is that! We can find out quickly who owns the loose pet if they have a micro-chip on board.

A great number of our dogs were registered during the very successful Wynnewood North Tail Waggers Event in November. If you were unable to attend the event, you still have the opportunity to enter the data and picture of your pet(s) into the Wynnewood North Directory. everything correctly, the dog information should appear when you search for you name and click on it.

How to Upate Your Information in the Directory—It is simple!

Simply Log-in to the Wynnewood North Web-site (www.wynnewoodnorth.org). Go to the Directory and do a search for your name. After the search, your name will appear in the upper right hand corner of the page. Click on your name and then you will see a button on the left hand side that states "Edit". Click on the button, scroll down until you find the **To see the WWN directory**, Click on the button, scroll down until you find the Emergency Contact information. Enter the information into the various spaces. Be sure and click on the "Save" button before you exit the page.

If you are not computer savvy, contact your Block Captain or Janice Coffee (Communications Directory) to help you get your latest information in the system.

Please NOTE the directory is only available to those who live in Wynnewood North. It is private and not available to the public.







Crime Watch—Jeff Sappenfield

Annual Overview

The neighborhood really came together this year when it comes to watching out for each other. Nextdoor.com was a huge reason for such great communication. We still have crime activity; however, when we look out for each other and call 911 when we see suspicious behavior, I believe we have an impact – we are either preventing criminal activity or at least catching the criminals and preventing those individuals from carrying on. We had a total 19 reported crimes in 2016, which, unlike other years, was spread out throughout the year with the most crimes occurring in December (4 crimes).

The VIP patrol program just completed its 8th year. We currently have a total of 61 VIP 's which includes 44 active members with at least one patrol each in 2016. Most of our VIP's complete 2 patrols a month, but around 5 or 6 of us patrol anywhere from 4 to 8 times a month. This was a record-setting year with a total of 286 patrols, which is an average of 23.8 patrols - or 31 hours' worth of patrolling - per month. In both April and June, we set a record of 27 patrols in one month.

For 2017, our goal is to average 25 patrols per month. As always, we are looking for new VIP's to help keep Wynnewood North Safe. Please email crime@wynnewoodnorth.com if you would like to be involved.

As we prepare for 2017 the WNNA Board is working on other solutions for decreasing the crime in Wynnewood North. Some of the methods include opening communication with nearby neighborhoods, increasing our VIP membership, and researching the crime prevention methods other neighborhoods in the metroplex are using. 2017 VIP Classes

There will be approximately four VIP classes throughout 2017. The first will most likely be late February or early March. If you are interested in attending a class or think you will be interested in becoming a VIP in 2017, please request the paperwork via email at crime@wynnewoodnorth.com. From there, we can determine the time of year that is best for you to become a VIP on patrol.

Crime Watch Communication

The best way to stay current on neighborhood crime and crime prevention tips is to become a member of Nextdoor.com. You can set up your membership to just receive information from Wynnewood North, from three or four nearby neighborhoods, or from all eleven neighborhoods that surround Wynnewood North. Other options include having Nextdoor.com email you with reminders of posts made by neighbors - the advantage of this is you don't have to be logged on and watching Nextdoor.com to get urgent FYI's or otherwise. There is also an app for cell phones. Neighbors utilize this site to make other neighbors aware of suspicious behavior such as suspicious vehicles or people in the neighborhood. I share information with our neighbors through this website when there is a crime in Wynnewood North, or have important information to share about crimes committed nearby. The police have begun to use this site to pass along information. Nextdoor.com is used for so much other useful information as well – such as recommendations for service providers, products, local businesses and events. If you are not on Nextdoor.com, please email me at <u>crime@wynnewoodnorth.com</u>. Once we have confirmed your status as a resident of Wynnewood North, we will be

Tailgate Thefts

A rash of tailgate thefts have occurred throughout Oak Cliff – three were here in Wynnewood North. The thieves are very brazen as they have stolen the tailgates in the middle of the night while the trucks are as close as 5 feet from a house entry point. Investigators are working on these thefts, but we are not yet sure of the priority; therefore, I suggest if you are unable to park your truck in your garage, purchase a tailgate lock which is available for around \$35.

Out-of-Town or Long-Term Construction

Just a reminder that if you are going to be out of town, or have long term construction, please be sure to email your name, address and the out-of-town or construction dates to crime@wynnewoodnorth.com. The VIP's on patrol will then be aware and can keep an eye on your home while patrolling during the dates submitted. Important tip: get to know your closest neighbors and become comfortable with providing each other out-of-town or long term construction dates. Your closest neighbors are typically the ones that will notice suspicious behavior before anyone else.

Community Service — Neighbors In Action — Vicki Patsdauter, Resident

Wynnewood North neighbors come to the rescue!

The Society for Companion Animals (SFCA) is a local pet rescue that was begun by one of our long-time neighbors, Tawana Couch. She grew up in Wynnewood North, and saw the numbers of stray dogs in our area. She started the rescue because, as a flight attendant, she thought she had a unique solution to this

problem. Fly the pets to states that have families waiting to adopt. These states do not have the issues the state of Texas has with loose dogs. In fact, they do not have enough for the families who wish to adopt. Enter Tawana, with her connections in the airline industry, convincing Ameri-



can airlines to fly these dogs north, and Southwest, to bring the crates back to be used again.

These dogs are the ones that need the help the most. Because we have such an overpopulation in Texas (she gets many dogs from the rescues along the border who have no room to hold them), most are healthy, but some are older dogs, heartworm positive, injured, or have mange. Without her help, these animals would probably be euthanized. SFCA helps pay for their boarding, the treatment and health certificates needed before sending them north. This can get quite expensive. They rescued over 500 dogs this year! Projected

Lynn and I have helped Tawana in the past, and Lynn saw a need and knew she could ask our great Wynnewood neighbors to help. They responded in the last couple of months to our call, and had great fun and some hard work at Boykin Kennels (where the dogs come to first) taking the dogs off the buses, checking them in, walking them, and getting them settled in the kennel. Other volunteers pick up crates from Southwest, assemble crates at Tawana's house and take them to Boykin. Volunteers take dogs to the vet for health certificate or for treatment, foster the dogs till it's time to leave, and then go to the airport to put the dogs on flights in the middle of the night to their new homes!

SFCA has an annual fundraiser auction and volunteers will help by finding donations for the auction and preparing the venue.

In Tawana's words: "We fly our animals to loving arms. It is only through your support



Community Service— Little Free Library—Vicki Patsdauter, Resident



Wynnewood North has its own Little

Free Library! Earlier this year, my friend from church was telling me about her Little Free Library. "What is that?" I said, and my curiosity grew and my excitement went through the roof. I had never heard of this, so immediately went home and googled it.

Little Free Library is a non-profit organization (www.littlefreelibrary.org), dedicated to promoting literacy and reading among neighbors, sharing books for adults and children alike. It was begun just 6 years

ago, and today there are 50,000 libraries worldwide! Little Free Libraries are hand-crafted structures (like a little school house) filled with constantly changing collections of books donated and shared by people of all ages and backgrounds. They are built to withstand weather of all kinds. To be called a Little Free Library, we had to have an official charter sign, charter number and listing on the LFL map online. As you can see below, Dallas has quite a few, but only 5 in the Oak Cliff area. I became determined to get one in our neighborhood. My friend Sheila, got me in touch with Johnny, who made hers. He let me pick out my colors (Green and Purple, of course), and next thing I

knew, I was picking it up at the church. Oops, I forgot to tell Lynn about it in my excitement!

Lynn's idea was to make a proposal to the neighborhood board to put it near one of the greenspaces. I thought it would take some convincing, but I wrote up a proposal, and Cynthia Michaels offered to present it at the board meeting in October. To my delight, they accepted the proposal!

Colter Hoggan volunteered (or maybe I drafted him) to dig the hole for the post and cement it in. Cynthia then put the library on the post. On November 17, the morning of the dedication, we had about 15 neighbors there to cheer. Alex on the corner has also offered to help, and keep an eye on the library. If you want to drop off books, she said she was willing to keep them, but please be selective and thoughtful about what you contribute.

Our own Little Free Library is at the corner of N. Manus and Monssen, in the triangle where there is shade from trees and a bench to sit on as you browse the books. I've already decided to add a "leash hook" so as you walk your dog, you can sit a moment to look through the books. I hope to add a couple of solar lights for night time viewing. There will be a guest book as well after the first of the year for you to add your comments or suggestions. As I get ideas, I will promote activities and games. Alex and I will try to rotate books so that every time you come, you may see something different. We also hope YOU will add a book here and there that you found interesting.

The motto for the LFL is "Take a book, leave a book". These books are free, with the hope that you will contribute one to take its place, although that is not a re-



quirement. My friend says her neighbors have kept books circulating, and even contributed card games and CD's. You will meet more neighbors, and children will see the library as a destination as they walk the neighborhood. Realtors have even said that Little Free Libraries have influenced potential home buyers to decide to settle in one neighborhood rather than another. The LFL conveys a sense of community and sharing. You may be surprised by the variety and quality of the books in our library. Our neighbors are diverse in their interests and hobbies! You may find a book on Koi (Colorful Japanese carp), or Regina Music Boxes that play tin records! Children may find books for a holiday, or that Harry Potter book they've been looking for.

Our LFL has a Facebook Page (Wynnewood North Little Free Library) that I'm still learning how to promote. You may have heard that the city of Dallas was considering regulating these libraries. I made sure our library would be within these guidelines if they went through. Eventually, it was seen to be a solution looking for a problem, and it was dropped. The variety and imagination that goes into some of these libraries is wonderful!

I want to thank all of you that supported this effort. Cynthia Michaels was vital in helping me get it approved, and Colter Hoggan in getting it set up. Susan Oakey helped get

ready for the dedication, and everyone who came out, brought books and applauded at the dedication, thank you!

Let's make this a shared experience! Give me your ideas, and look through your or your children's books to see what you can contribute. Write a little note about why this book was interesting to you or your child. Then, stop by, sit a spell, and get lost.....in a book!








Spay & Neuter

All dogs and cats in the City of Dallas must either be spayed or neutered, or the owner will need to obtain an Intact Animal Permit. There are a few exemptions to this ordinance:

- •Dogs and cats under six (6) months of age;
- •Dogs and cats unable to be spayed/neutered or is permanently non-fertile for
- Service animals:
- Competition cat or competition dog;
- •Dogs and cats for adoption at Dallas Animal Services, other animal welfare groups, or for sale in licensed retail pet stores; or
- Owners holding a valid Intact Animal Permit

DAS and their partners strive to provide free and low-cost spay/neuter services for Dallas residents. Availability of these services, however, is dependent upon funding, and programs and offers change frequently.
